Blooming barrows:

We now own 19 very distinctive wheelbarrows and we are grateful to Nigel Ferrar

at Jewson's of Rugby who donated three of them. These have been delivered to groups throughout the village who will be planting them up and in due course, these too will be displayed in a variety of village locations so keep a look out for them.

FODS signs: We will be providing both troughs and wheelbarrows with signs to show who has created them. Each of these 'planters' will provide a wonderful splash of colour for our village and we are most grateful to everyone who has taken part. This combined, community effort will really help with our submission. Thank you all.

Hanging baskets: One hundred of these are on order and are being offered for sale to central village businesses and properties to provide even more colour to the village. Our thanks to everyone who has purchased one.

Gateway planters: We have now taken delivery of some fabulous planters which will provide a welcoming and colourful display when planted and positioned at the village gateway signs.

We are grateful to Dunchurch Baptist Church who have volunteered to care for the one on the Coventry Rd and if anyone else would like to offer help for the others,




we would love to hear from you.

Dunchurch Allotment Association:

The advice and help of the DAA has been invaluable throughout the planning of our awards entry and we are most grateful to them for their help. Thank you.

Wildlife booklet: We delivered free of

charge to 1,700 homes, our Guide to Producing a Wildlife Friendly Garden and have been pleased with the positive feedback we received. It is hoped that many more will



join us in creating wildlife habitats in their own gardens as the importance of bio diversity cannot be underestimated.

Hall Close orchard: At our request, the Tree Officer from RBC has visited the orchard and is arranging to tidy the snapped branches, sever the ivy which is strangling the

trees and remove any major dead wood so that our volunteers may begin work on the site. Our prime consideration is to keep the orchard a wildlife friendly area, but we will also be working toward making the site easy access for all. We are contacting other village groups, particularly those involving children to seek

their views on how they would like to use the area. Some suggestions have included individual group growing plots for flowers and vegetables and an area for bee keeping. We will keep you posted on progress.

Large troughs: We are most grateful to the Hill St Centre in Rugby who donated two large troughs.

These will shortly be planted with herbs and placed in a public area for all to share.

The wishing tree: We have purchased 75 wooden tags and once 'lockdown' is lifted, we will be placing these at the base of a tree on the war memorial

green. Please stop by and leave a positive message for others to read or even a small drawing to be enjoyed by others. Thank you.

Keep Dunchurch tidy

You may have seen our volunteers out in

their distinctive hi vis jackets. Usually meeting on a Sunday morning, they weed, sweep, trim edges and even wash bins as they go, and we are very grateful to them for helping to maintain our lovely village. sessions often end with a coffee and a chat, so it is a great way of meeting new people.

Virtual balloon race

Like many organisations, our fundraising has suffered during 'lockdown' so, we were pleased to be able to have some Easter fun with our virtual Balloon Race which raised £200. There were daily prizes of Easter eggs and £25 for the overall winner. This went to Harry and his aptly named balloon Haribo. Harry generously shared his winnings with his older brother and together, they bought some new garden toys. Thank you everyone who took part.

Let's hope that our planting and community projects will provide a welcome distraction.

I have not been able to resume going into the Parish Office, nor open the Community Library. However, I am still working from home and working on behalf of the community in Dunchurch, so it seems to be timely to say that if anyone needs any extra help or support, please don't hesitate to get in touch and I will try and help - contact details below. Planning has taken up quite a lot of time

We need you!

Are you interested in the future of development in Dunchurch?

If so, we need you! Please consider getting in touch with us so you can join our friendly Dunchurch Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group

and I am delighted that our newest Councillor, Paul Le Poidevin, is taking the lead on Planning issues and has recently taken on the Dunchurch Neighbourhood Plan.

The DPC has held several Dunchurch Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group meetings in the last couple of months and as I mentioned above, it is really, really important in respect of future development in and around Dunchurch. Planning rules are changing, and communities can set out what they want to see for the future of their Community on planning matters. When the Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) is adopted by Rugby Borough Council (RBC), it will be classed as a material consideration when considering planning applications.

The DPC has recently formulated a response to Application: R19/1047, which is a Reserved Matters application for 86 dwellings and associated works at Dipbar Fields, Daventry Road. Outline planning permission has already been granted by RBC, therefore the DPC is not able to object to the proposals; however, we can raise concerns, which we have done in the strongest terms. As you may be aware, one of the most important tasks that the DPC does is to respond to a variety of planning appli-

cations each month which can usually be seen via the minutes on the DPC website and the RBC Planning Portal https://planning.agileapplications.co.uk/rugby/search-applications/

As you may know, the DPC is short of three Councillors to represent the community in Dunchurch and legislation demands that if ten electors in Dunchurch request an election, by law we must have one. An election should have taken place on 6th May; however, I was advised by RBC that no one had submitted their nomination papers. Therefore, all the polling cards in Dunchurch had to be altered and posted out again. This is obviously an admin fee burden that the DPC is liable for. Again, due to the same legislation, RBC is required to organise and administer another election for three DPC Councillors and I will be notified of the date shortly. Once again, the DPC will be liable to meet the cost out of public funds.

If you are considering becoming a Parish Councillor, you can obtain nomination papers from either RBC or myself.

Finance is always a priority for the DPC,

The DPC has set its budget for the financial year 2021/2022 and this can also be viewed on the website or by contacting me for a hard copy.

The DPC has been holding Zoom meetings each month and anyone is welcome to attend. Please contact me and I will send you the registration details. The new redesigned website contains much more information and, we hope, will be a lot easier to navigate.

The next full DPC Ordinary meeting will be held on Monday, I4th June 2021 commencing at 7.00 pm. Depending on the circumstances, this meeting may be held outside the Library.

Lord John Douglas Montagu Douglas Scott (Part 3)

ady John Scott erected a loving monument at Cawston to her husband's memory, in the form of a sundial, designed by her ladyship on the model of the old royal one at Holyrood. The dial which is globular, is supported by a pillar with serpent twining upwards. On the panels of the base are the armorial bearings and the mottoes of the families of Scott and Spottiswoode, and on the capital surmounting the pillar are engraved the initials of Lord and Lady John, with the mottoes: United In Time - Parted In Time -To Be Reunited When Time Shall Be No More

It became the Tenants' determination to subscribe to a memorial to Lord John and it was decided that it should take the form of a statue. The subscription list included most of the tenants and several tradesmen from Rugby and upwards of 300 guineas was raised. Again, we have the Rugby Advertiser to thank for recording the following event. This extract is from 14th September 1867.

Unveiling of the Statue of Lord John Scott

The execution of the statue was entrusted to Mr. Durham A.R.A. and a very beautiful work of art is the result. His Lordship is represented in ordinary walking costume, with plaid and wide-awake. The figure, 7ft 6in high, is in Portland stone and stands on a pedestal of the same material, the total height being 17ft 6in. On Monday 2nd September 1867 the statue was formally presented to His Grace the Duke of Buccleuch. Shortly after one o'clock the Duke of Buccleuch and Lady Scott, accompanied by the Earl of Dalkeith, C.N. Newdegate Esq., M.P., Colonel Cust and C.M. Caldecott Esq., were met by a number of the tenantry and conducted to a stage close to the statue, which was surrounded by a large number of the residents of Rugby, Dunchurch and the neighbourhood. After the statue had been unveiled, Mr. H.J. Bromfield of Cawston read the address, and afterwards presented the parchment containing it to the Duke of Buccleuch. The Duke replied that he would gladly accept the guardianship of the monument. He added for Lady Scott how much she felt and appreciated this occasion. About forty of the Duke's tenants dined at the Crown at half-past two, the Duke himself being present. At four o'clock about forty of the principal Tenants, who had received invitations from Lady John Scott, sat down to a most sumptuous repast at Cawston

llotment members in Dunchurch are pleased to welcome nine new allotmenteers this season.

A decade ago, they would most likely have all been men. Times have changed and the new batch of allotment holders are overwhelmingly women.

Membership of Dunchurch Allotment Association is edging towards equal numbers of male and female, with a waiting list predominantly made up of women. The likelihood is that garder female allotment holders will outnumber seedlii

a recent study carried out by

Imperial College London found of the 682 sites in London, over 60% of the plots were held by women.

In times gone by, the allotment was largely the preserve of working men who were there primarily to produce food for the family table. In recent times allotmenteering has become more of a recreational activity

than a budgeting necessity. The recent female members of the allotments at Dunchurch give a variety of reasons for

taking on a plot
- for some it's
teaching children

about food and gardening, for others it's concern for the planet and reducing

food miles and for many, it's a place to retreat to, where they can work, relax and exercise in an outdoor environment.

Spring is probably the busiest time of the year for vegetable

gardeners; preparing the beds, nurturing seedlings and adapting to wide swings

in weather. For the new gardener, it's a time when lots of helpful advice will be freely offered – which seeds to sow, when to plant and how far apart.

Enthusiastically, the hundreds of seeds in the packet will all have been planted and the experienced gardeners will nod and with wry smiles note the

It can be confidently said, allotments are all about sharing stories, experience and produce.

Covid 19 and the effects on business

t will take many years for the world economy to fully recover from the effects of the global pandemic. However, closer to home, our own village businesses have been hit hard and some, like the hairdressers and beauty salons, will sadly have been unable to trade at all by the nature of the business they run. However, others have shown great resilience and initiative in an effort to 'weather the storm'

Tony and Sandy at the post office have done a sterling job to keep going, by operating a 'one in one out' policy. Square Coffee switched from a 'sit in' café to a takeaway service including some weekend meal takeaways, both of which seem to have been well supported.

Paula at Wanda's made great use of social media by recording videos of new stock arrivals on the new Friends of Wanda's Facebook page – and how great to see the shop feature on BBC CWR Radio and in a short film *The Sound* to herald the re-opening of small businesses in Coventry and Warwickshire.

Other businesses have shared with us in their own words how they have coped.

Anne-Marie's Florist

Anne-Marie explains, 'I was relieved to receive the government grant which has helped with the financial burden and the furlough scheme was also beneficial. However, having lost two members of staff, it has been left to me and just one other part-furloughed member of staff to run the shop. I have worked every day pretty much since the 23rd March 2020 and it has been exhausting in both body and mind, but I have managed to keep my shop going by carrying out safe distance delivery and collections by prior appointment. Sadly, the funeral work has been immense and recently, I lost a very good friend to Covid who was only just 61 years old. Like many others, the emotional strain of the past year has taken its toll.'

Rugby Flooring

'While our fitting teams are currently operating as normal, being classed as a non-essential retailer has meant that our village showroom had to close during the national lockdowns. This has obviously made it more difficult to show potential customers our flooring products but we have overcome this by ordering swatch samples direct to our customers' homes or by taking our larger sample boards out on quotation visits.

After the first national lockdown we were able to trial opening our showroom 'by appointment only'. This allowed us to limit the number of people in the showroom at any one time and to clean surfaces and samples between customers. It also allowed us to carry out private consultations with customers to find them the perfect flooring solution to meet their needs.

From Hollywood to Dunchurch

'm sitting around a large table in a film studio with several actors, including Dustin Hoffman on my right, Robert DeNiro on my left and across from Woody Harrelson and Willie Nelson. An eclectic group to be sure and I seemed to be the odd one out. But it wasn't a dream. I was an important part of the pre-production process of the film Wag the Dog and was working with the director Barry Levinson and the actors on the script.

When I was 13 and studying shorthand at school in Coventry, I never imagined that this skill would open doors for me in the Hollywood film industry. I had actually dreamed of being in Hollywood since I was a little girl, probably influenced by my mother who was 'film star mad'. Every Christmas she bought me one or two film star books, which I always thought were more for her than me and she would tell me the storylines of films she'd seen, such as Gone with the Wind, and films starring George Raft and James Cagney. She particularly liked George Raft because apparently, he'd been a ballroom dancer before he was an actor. Since my mother was a pretty good dancer herself - she'd won a silver cup for her talent at the tango - I understood the affinity she had with Mr. Raft.

Her interest and knowledge of film stars of the day clearly rubbed off on me and I nurtured a desire to be an actress.



I was an active member of the school drama group and according to my wonderful English Literature teacher, Mr. Wildsmith, had talent. However, my regional Coventry accent didn't really pass muster, so he recommended I take elocution lessons. He put me in touch with a friend of his, Miss Simpson, a woman in her mid-fifties and 'terribly proper', who taught lessons at the local community centre and whose diction was more Queen's English than Coventry slang. The lessons cost one shilling and I took this out of my two shillings and six pence, or half a crown, pocket money every week.

I absolutely loved the classes with Miss Simpson and encouraged my best friend, Carolyn, to come along. Even though we did a lot of giggling because the exercises seemed silly: 'How Now Brown Cow'; 'Father's Car is a Jaguar' and 'Betty Botter Bought Some Butter', they were effective in helping us round out the vowels and in reducing our 'common' way of

speaking. Of course, when we were back at school, we had to make sure we didn't speak with 'hoity-toity' accents, so that we weren't ostracised.

With the help of Miss Simpson, I achieved certificates from the English Speaking Board as well as the Royal Society of Arts, and when I was 15, one of the RSA adjudicators recommended me for a scholarship to the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art (RADA) in London. However, my mother was against this, arguing that I was too young to leave home and go to London, 'And besides, what's the point because after all, you'll just be getting married, having babies and scrubbing floors.' So, that put an end to that. She could not stop me from acting

though and I was accepted into a community theatre group, which I was part of for eight years, always playing leading roles. I was somewhat on the shy side and loved being able to escape into a character and being appreciated for who I was. The sound of the applause was so rewarding and gave me great pleasure, as well as giving my self-esteem a boost. I think it was Sir Laurence Olivier who said that 'actors were strange creatures because they were only happy being someone else.'

Marriage to a fellow thespian, followed by divorce, set me on a journey of reallife dramas. My path eventually led to Toronto where I worked in television and PR, and then on to Los Angeles and a career in the film industry.

I worked with the Samuel Goldwyn Company as an executive assistant for a couple of years, then was a publicist on the American Cinema Awards, produced by David Gest, who you may recall later married Lisa Minnelli (Michael Jackson was his best man). David subsequently came to England and became a reality star before his death here in 2016. The show he was producing was to honour old movie stars who had never won an award and suddenly, I was surrounded by so many of the stars I'd seen in my film star books, and in charge of making sure all their needs were met. Remember Butterfly McQueen from Gone with

the Wind? Her famous quote was: 'Oh, Miss Scarlett! I don't know nothin' 'bout birthin' babies!' She was there, so was Jennifer Jones, Angie Dickinson, Cesar Romero, Dorothy Lamour and so many more. Now, I realise these are names that younger readers may not be familiar with, but believe me, they were among the crème-de-la-crème of old Hollywood. It was such a thrill for me.

Next, I was back in television helping two famous comedy writers create sketches for an episodic TV show, with the help of my shorthand skills, of

course! The director of this series was Barry Levinson, who was fascinated by this unique and now outdated form of recording words and asked me to work with him on his next screenplay, *Tin Men*, when he returned from directing *Young Sherlock Holmes* in England.

Although I did many other jobs in television, including writing my own scripts for day-time TV and adding sound effects to the comedy series, my work with Barry Levinson gave me the opportunity to work in feature films and work with 'A' list actors. As well as being his personal

he Trust exists to 'relieve either generally or individually, persons resident in the area of benefit (that is, the villages of Dunchurch and Thurlaston) who are in need, hardship or distress.' This could include assistance (where not otherwise met by Statutory Services) to pay for medical aids or equipment in the home.

The income of the Trust



is derived principally from investments, which in turn result from bequests made in the 18th and 19th centuries. The Trust is also the owner and administrator of the land along Coventry Road known as The Allotments. A small portion of the Trust's income is derived from the rental of these allotments.

In recent years the Trust has been active in providing financial assistance to, amongst others, the following:

- A child resident in the area, who is physically handicapped and in need of physiotherapy, was given a grant to enable her to attend specialist treatment sessions in Cardiff and to attend a Disability Swimming Therapy Week.
- A contribution was made towards the installation of a defi-

- brillator at Dunchurch Village Hall.
- A grant was made to Thurlaston Village Hall to assist in the provision of a 'disabled-friendly toilet facility' in the hall.
- Grants were also made to Myton Hospice.
 During the period April to December 2020, notwithstanding the Covid pandemic, Myton looked after 11 villagers who received a total of 134 days of in-patient care. The Hospice also made a total of 359 home visits during this period.

Interviews were held at the old surgery, but with the promise of modern new premises which were under construction. To the interviewees, Dunchurch was welcoming and friendly with a distinctive village atmosphere and it was clear that the practice was well thought of locally. It was also clear that Drs Hunter and Holcroft genuinely cared about their patients offering traditional, personal 'cradle to grave' family medicine. Even then, many practices were losing this continuity of personal care.

The welcoming ethos of the practice

was fostered by the partners with the help of the Practice Manager, Mrs Margaret Baynes and her close knit team. Practice management had developed over the 1980s and managers have had an increasingly pivotal role in the running of the practice. The practice team also continued to expand with more practice nurses, district nurses, health visitors and midwives being integrated into the team.

lan had worked in Bristol and Liz in Lincolnshire and both brought new skills, fresh ideas and varied experiences from outside the area. They wanted to develop the practice at Dunchurch with computerisation and new services but were also keen to preserve the traditional elements of general practice. They were delighted to be appointed as partners at the surgery and looked forward to an exciting future.

Commonwealth War Graves signboard

isitors to St Peter's Churchyard will have noticed the new sign-board setting out the locations of the eight Commonwealth War Graves: four from each World War.

The signboard is located on the right side of the main path leading along the right-hand side of the church and placed so that the two groups of four graves are visible from the board. It is also

angled at 45° to enable wheelchair users to position themselves under the front edge of the board to view the names and locations.

The sign was designed and

created by Phil Taylor, a traditional signwriter from Leamington Spa. Hand-painted and with the names gilded, it is made of Tricoya for extreme durability and Phil informed me that it is meant to last 50 years. As he does not anticipate anyone requesting him to do repairs then, the current guarantee is for ten years.

Owing to its historic importance for Dunchurch, half the cost was met by three private donations. As St Peter's met the remaining half from its Legacy Fund, anyone wishing to make a further donation (whether small or large) would be most welcome.

The war memorial outside the church gates contains the names of 60 service personnel who gave their lives in the two World Wars: 43 from World War I and 17 from World War II.

As shown by the list of Rugby Area service personnel killed from 1914 (link from the Archive Pages – Memorials, on the FODS website), the majority died overseas. There was an official policy of non-repatriation so that only those who died in military hospitals in the UK as



result of their war service or killed in action in the air over the UK or in coastal waters, were buried in UK cemeteries.

Those commemorated on the new signboard

are shown on the next page. There is no respect for age in this list of the deceased as it ranges from 18 to 50. Private Hughes died on Armistice Day and Private Hopkins and Lance Corporal Evans just before, which must have intensified their families' grief. Harry Evans's parents proudly noted that he had been wounded three times in action.

Interestingly, his name does not appear on the Dunchurch war memorial and only his initial H is mentioned on the CWGC website. Fortunately, the reference to Thurlaston assisted me as it was imperative that the names on the signboard were accurate. Brian Bowsher of St Edmund's Thurlaston helpfully confirmed that Harry Evans's name is read out there with the names of the Fallen on Remembrance Sunday.

Flying Officer Warren died only 16 days after Britain declared war on Germany. Sapper Bell died 2 years 5 months after VE Day.

There is clearly much more to these men's stories than appear in the bare details of dates, ranks and units. Perhaps it is not too late to ask readers of this article if they have more information to share for future articles. Commemorated on the signboard

Private James Amos Hughes of the Ox & Bucks Light Infantry. Died 11 November 1918 aged 22. Son of Mrs Harriet Hughes of Daventry Road.

Private Leonard John Hopkins of the Devonshire Regiment. Died 30 October 1918 aged 18. Son of Mr and Mrs E. Hopkins of The Green.

Company Sergeant Major Jonathan Mulcaster of the Manchester Regiment. Died 13 June 1917 aged 50. Husband of Elizabeth Mulcaster of 35 Daventry Road, and veteran of the Boer Wars in S. Africa.

Lance Corporal Harry Evans of the King's Royal Rifle Corps. Died 6 November 1918 aged 23. Son of William and Annie Evans of Thurlaston. Wounded three times.

Sapper Donald Bell of the Royal Engineers. Died 29 September 1947 aged 35. Son of Robert and Julia Bell, husband of Sarah.

Flying Officer John Henry Warren of 605 Squadron RAF. Died 19 September 1939.

Marine Dennis Roy Miles of the Royal Marines. Died I June 1943 aged 19. Son of Donald and Amelia Miles.

Flying Officer Desmond George Mitchell of 15 Squadron RAF Volunteer Reserve. Died 24 August 1943 aged 20. Son of Leslie and Mabel Mitchell, and possibly a musician.


Crashed into Dunchurch Statue


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
