Orchard

Overgrown with nettles, we are beginning to tame the orchard although it is

not merely a case of cutting back and mowing. We are mindful of other plants that may be growing there and of course the wildlife and are delighted that since the addition of bird boxes, the smaller birds have started to move in. We are researching the history of the site and more recently, have been able to establish via the RHS, the apple trees are Bramley Seedlings, a delicious cooking variety (see page 7). We believe these may previously have provided fruit for the Winton Hall School kitchen.

Regarding community use, having spoken to leaders of children's groups, we have contacted a forest school expert to see how best we may utilise the space as a teaching environment and we are also investigating the viability of a pond. The help of Claire Siddaway and the Rugby Natural History Society has been invaluable throughout this process. Thank you.



Bramley Seedling Apple

his ultimate English cooking apple has a sharp taste with one of the highest acidic contents of any variety. This helps it to maintain a diced shape during cooking and makes it one of the most popular of cooking apples. It provides a profusion of juice also making it popular with cider brewers.

The trees are generally quite large and long lived and it is reported that the first tree appeared in a garden in Nottinghamshire in 1809. Amazingly, it still survives to this day.

Let's get ready to crumble!

Christmas apple crumble

Serves 6
Preparation time 25 mins

Filling

850g Bramley apples

2 ripe pears

1/2 lemon, juice only

250g mincemeat

75g golden caster sugar

½ tsp ground cinnamon

1/4 tsp freshly grated nutmeg

125g marzipan

For the crumble

225g plain flour

150g unsalted butter, diced and chilled

pinch salt

50g golden caster sugar

50g flaked almonds



Method

Preheat the oven to 180°C/ 160°C Fan/ Gas 4.

Peel, quarter and core the apples and pears. Cut the fruit into bite-size pieces and put in a large bowl. Squeeze over the lemon juice and toss the fruit well to coat in the juice.

Add the mincemeat, caster sugar, ground cinnamon and nutmeg to the fruit and mix again.

Cut the marzipan into small dice the size of a raisin and stir into the mixture. Tip into an ovenproof dish, spread evenly and cover with foil. Bake on the middle shelf for

10 minutes while you make the crumble.

For the crumble, tip the plain flour into a large mixing bowl, add diced butter and a pinch of salt. Using your fingertips rub the butter into the flour until the crumble starts to look like sand.


Continue rubbing in until the crumble starts to form clumps. Add the sugar and flaked almonds and mix again to combine.

Scatter the crumble over the fruit in an even layer. Return to the oven, uncovered and cook for 45 minutes, or until the fruit is bubbling and the crumble is golden-brown.

Serve with custard or brandy cream and enjoy!



newly converted stables. All that effort was rewarded by three sell-out, socially distanced performances which raised £1,053 for local good causes and extremely positive responses from audiences immensely grateful to get closer to normal. Generous contributions to our 'famous' raffle and our bucket collection on behalf of the Air Ambulance and the Children's Cancer and Leukaemia Group, (in memory of 14-year-old Fred who sadly died last year) raised a further £400. This will be split equally between the two charities.

As many people said, our village is blessed to have a great bunch of talented people to put on such a fun show.

The DPC has held various Dunchurch Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group meetings as it is important to gain the views of the community on development in and around Dunchurch. Planning rules are changing, and communities can set out what they want to see for the future of their community on planning matters. When the Neighbourhood Development Plan is adopted by Rugby Borough Council, it will be classed as a material consideration, which means that when planners consider all planning applications, they must take more notice of what we say on your behalf!

The DPC is delighted to welcome Jon Marlow and Ian Grogan on to our friendly team, which brings the total number of councillors to nine. There will be another election shortly, so if anyone is interested, please give me a call and we can have a chat.

Finance is always a priority for the DPC, and details of income and expenditure

can be found on the council website https://dunchurchpc.org/agendas-and-minutes.php, together with the latest bank reconciliation reports, which are completed monthly.

We are also pleased that we have been able to fund over £15,000 into community projects this year.

The DPC agreed to appoint a contractor to re-furbish the Thatched Bus Shelter; however, we decided to delay the start of the works until February or March next year when the work at Dunchurch crossroads is complete.

Unfortunately, there were a few teething problems with the crossroads re-modelling, but we are in constant touch with the contractors, so if you are experiencing any issues, please contact us.

The DPC has started face-to-face meetings again and everyone is welcome to attend. The next few meetings will be on the second Monday of the month: 13th December 2021, 10th January 2022 (Budget Meeting) and 7th February




An Albino Squirrel in Dunchurch?

There have been several sightings of this white squirrel over the past couple of months but is it a genuine albino squirrel or just a rare genetic morph that has resulted in it being born with white fur? The only real way to tell is by studying the eyes which in the case of albinos are red. Having studied the photo, it does appear that we do indeed have this rare phenomenon in Dunchurch.

Albino squirrels are so rare with only an estimated 50 of them living in the UK.




Dunchurch Allotment Association

Families from the village were invited to find the scarecrows by exploring the allotment site and recording as many named figures as they could. Most popular were characters from films such as Captain Jack Barrow, Harry Pothead and 'May the Fork be with you' Darth Vader. There was also a local connection, with Guy Forks looking

particularly threatening. Visitors were invited to partake of refreshments



The Allotment Association sees itself as being an integral part of village life and participates actively in relevant events. This year two of our members took up the challenge of growing all the flowers for the village hanging baskets, a task that was both demanding and caused some unease with the responsibility. 

Doctors in Dunchurch

Part II - By Dr Ian Czerniewski, Dunchurch GP since 1991

uring the 1990s the practice enjoyed the breathing space of the new surgery and learned to use computers which have, of course, become an essential part of working life. The fundamental work of caring for patients from cradle to grave had not changed though and the practice ethos was to maintain the traditional continuity of care.

Dr Czerniewski continued Dr Blundstone's minor surgery clinics at the practice, removing moles, cysts and warts while Dr Roberts developed gynaecology and Family Planning services.

Dr Holcroft continued to practice homeopathy within her role as a GP and continued independent homeopathy after retiring from NHS General Practice in 1997. She was respected for her straightforward honesty and common sense and her understanding of holistic care and the need to avoid over-medicating patients. She had many loyal patients, some of whom had moved to the practice with her and who still remember her with great affection. Although she was too modest to mention it at work, Dr Holcroft was also a keen and very successful golfer.

Dr Hunter has also written a little about his time at the Practice. During his 35 years at Dunchurch Surgery he looked after consecutive generations of several families, looking after pregnant women, whom he had himself delivered. Longstanding patients speak of the long-haired,

speak of the long-haired, leather-jacketed, young assistant doctor of the 1960s who formed many enduring professional relationships with patients for whom he was a trusted confidante. His concern for vulnerable patients and his obvious compassion for them were striking examples of good traditional family medicine, which quickly became apparent to his new partners. His commitment to the patients and to working at all hours was truly vocational and he, too, is often mentioned with great affection 23 years after his retirement in 1998.

Following these retirements Drs Czerniewski and Roberts' search for new partners culminated in the appointment of Dr David Carne (all the way from Melbourne) and shortly afterwards, Dr Kate Reynolds, (all the way from... Sawbridge.)

Dr Carne had been involved in GP Training at his previous practice and we hoped to use his experience to help the practice to meet the requirements to become a Training Practice.

Would this ambition be realised?

A Reflective Account

By Dr John Airlie Hunter, GP in Dunchurch 1963–1998

arrived in Dunchurch in 1963 with my wife and baby and was greeted by the active partner Dr Blundstone who introduced me to Dr and Mrs Edmondson. The Edmondsons lived at Rose Ash on the Bilton Grange estate which the headmaster, Rex Machin, had made available to them after their home Dunsmore House was bombed in 1940.

As Dr Edmondson became increasingly crippled by Parkinson's Disease the burden of running the practice caused Dr Blundstone to look for an assistant, and that is where I came in.

The surgery was a small two-roomed brick building, the walls of which had been reinforced for use as an air raid shelter during the war. It had previously been the pavilion of the Dunchurch Bowling Club located behind the Dun Cow. It comprised a waiting room, a consulting room, a passage with an Elsan toilet and a rear exit. Apart from Mrs Lee who kept it clean, and an occasional secretary, there was no ancillary staff. Surgeries were held every morning including Saturday from nine until ten, when the door was closed. When the last patient had been seen, Dr Blundstone and I drove to Rose Ash where Mrs Edmondson gave us tea and, in the presence of Dr Edmondson, discussed the calls that she had received from patients.



Armed with this information we went out on home visits. The wife of the doctor on duty would pass on any other incoming enquiries or calls, day and night. Evening surgeries were from six to seven. An antenatal clinic preceded the Tuesday evening surgery, and home confinements were the norm.

After Dr Edmondson's death in 1964, I became a partner and we planned a new surgery adjacent to the old one which was demolished in 1966. The new single storey prefabricated premises were larger and had a phone – a novelty. Administrative staff and a practice nurse were employed. Over the next two decades the patient list expanded as more houses were built. When Dr Holcroft joined the practice in 1981 the unused bicycle porch was converted into her consulting room.

Dr Blundstone retired in 1991 just as the existing surgery was erected on Dunsmore Heath. I enjoyed seven more years working at our splendid new premises with Dr Holcroft and my new partners Drs Czerniewski and Roberts.

Dunchurch War Memorial Unveiling Ceremony

ODS archivists are grateful to members of the public who continue to provide us with wonderful items for preservation. This year, the Dunchurch War Memorial is 100 years old and we have received two such donations which we are delighted to share.

NUMBER AND THURLASTON WAS HENORIAL Bindey, May 1988, 1881, or 4 p.m.

Cathy Briscoe sent us this wonderful photo which was originally given as a Christmas gift in 1921. It is a photograph so full of stories and as it is probably one hundred years since it was taken, I thought it may be nice to return it to its home in time for Remembrance Day 2021'

The second item, a service sheet for the Unveiling and Dedication of the Dunchurch Memorial, has been donated by Tony Ansell who found it in his stepmother's belongings.

Both will be stored along with a full account of the Rugby Advertiser article, 20 May 1921 (provided courtesy of Paul Waller), as follows:

'Favoured by fine weather, the unveiling and dedication ceremony of the Dunchurch and Thurlaston War Memorial took place on Sunday afternoon before a large number of people. The memorial, which is situated on a piece of green in front of the school, consists of an octagonal base

in which there are four steps, surmounted by panels, also in the form of an octagon, on which the names of the fallen are inscribed, and a plinth carrying a cross.

The inscription is "In ever living memory of the men of Dunchurch and Thurlaston who died fighting for faith and freedom in the great war, 1914–1918."

At the service there were lined up round the memorial a detachment of the Rugby Howitzer Battery, commanded by Lieut-Col C P Nickalls, Major Constantine, the relatives of those whose names were recorded on the memorial, the discharged soldiers from the village under Major Neilson and the Dunchurch Brass Band under Mr Timms. Amongst those present were Sir Samuel and Lady Waring and Miss Waring, Mrs Holdsworth, Mr and Mrs Davenport and Mrs McNulty.

After the hymn *Brief life is here our portion* had been sung, Lady Waring unveiled the memorial in the following words: "To the glory of God and in certain hope of the glorious resurrection I unveil this memorial in grateful memory of the men of Dunchurch and Thurlaston who fell for their beloved country in the great war."

The Rev C T B McNulty, Vicar of Holy Trinity, Leamington, formerly Vicar of Dunchurch and temporary Chaplain to H M Forces, in dedicating the memorial said, "Let us remember with thanksgiving and honour before men, the men of Dun-

church and Thurlaston who died fighting for faith and freedom in the Great War of 1914–1918. In the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Ghost, I dedicate this memorial to the glory of God in memory of those whose names are inscribed upon it who fell in the Great War. May their example inspire us to courage in the greater war they missed, however, may their memory ever burn brightly amongst those here who remember their deeds and strengthen them by their fellowship to look forward to the re-union with them in the heritage of the Saints."

A prayer was offered by the Rev W Vaughan and following the singing of On the Resurrection morning the Blessing was pronounced by the Vicar of Dunchurch (the Rev E P Rowland). He read the following telegram, "National Association are with you to-day in homage to fallen comrades. May they rest in peace – Jackson, President."

Major-General Sir Frederick Poole, in an address, said it was just about two years ago when they assembled there to greet on their home-coming the men of Dunchurch and Thurlaston and he remembered and thought all who were there must have felt the same, the tinge of sadness that marred the gaiety, the remembrance of those who had not come back. It was their sad day and they were assembled in love and reverence to the 43 sons of Dunchurch and Thurlaston who

had made the supreme sacrifice. There was no science of anything to tell them what a loss they had sustained by giving up their young lives and what remained was the memorial to their love and selfsacrifice. Great as their sorrow was, surely they must feel a thrill of pride when they thought of the ordeal that their boys were called upon to face and how nobly they responded to it. Down the ages the history of the British Isles was intermingled with stories of heroism and it was a source of pride to feel that what their boys endured and faced and accomplished would bear comparison with any deeds that had been handed down to them by their forefathers. The memorial would serve as a constant reminder of the loss they had suffered. When they passed it they would think of that as sanctified ground, bought at a great price and paid for by the lives given that they might live. If they found their country worth dying for, it was the duty of those who were left to make it worth living for and the memorial, which pointed out to them service and self-sacrifice, should soften their hearts to pull down the barriers which greed, self-seeking and suspicion had raised in the country with such dire results. It would soften their hearts to bring them to the high ideals they had in 1914, when, faced with a great danger, they had one common thought that worked for the common weal. That cross would serve to remind their children and their children's children of their heroism

and be an incentive to emulate the deeds of their ancestors and to surpass them.

The National Anthem was sung and a firing party fired a volley over the memorial and the service closed with the sounding of the Last Post and the Reveille. In addition to a number of wreaths placed at the foot of the memorial by relatives, there were others from the War Memorial Committee, the Discharged Soldiers, the Cricket and Football Club, the Dunchurch Brass Band, the Social Club and the Boys' School. The arrangements for the memorial, which cost about £450, were carried out by a committee, of which the Rev E P Rowland was chairman and Mr J H Dew secretary.'




