
success. We are indeed fortunate to have such a wide variety of businesses at the very heart of our community and all are deserving of our patronage.

# Hari Clark - Topper Sailing World Champion

-year-old Hari Clark has beaten 39 other young contenders from all over the world to win the Topper 4.2 World Championship, held in Mar Menor, Spain, from 22–26 July.

Dunchurch boy Hari has only been sailing for three years, and racing for just two. He started by taking a beginner's sailing course at Draycote Water Sailing Club, but quickly moved on to serious

racing after getting a boat of his own, competing in Midlands then National meetings all over the UK.

With a fellow Draycote sailor he decided to enter the 'Worlds 24', and his dad Richard drove him to Mar Menor, a saltwater lagoon in Murcia. Here he had five full days of intensive racing. By day four he had won nine of ten races, clinching the title, so his mum Nithiya, who had



stayed at home to look after the dog, hopped on a plane and got there in time for his last day, and to see him collect the winner's cup at the award ceremony.

Amongst the many sailing trophies proudly displayed in his house is one for winning a chess competition – in fact his eye for chess may be a key to his tactical skills when racing. A very talented young man!





Branches, logs,





birdboxes, wellies, flowerpots, saucers planted with gardens had been converted to desirable residences (one featuring an

# Knowing Stillness Meditation Group

ach Wednesday morning, despite the arrival of the refuse-collection lorry, a sense of peace and tranquillity descends in one corner of Dunchurch, as the Knowing Stillness Meditation Group meets at the Community Library from 10 to 10.45 am.

'Knowing Stillness' is an inner journey. It is the stilling and harmonising of body and mind. In this busy, chaotic world, we need to take time to simply be still with ourselves. Participants are invited to let go of any control and manipulation in their practice, so that a state of harmony, balance and awareness can be generated. 'Being present' can consolidate good things in one's life. Also, importantly, the group cultivates a sense of community.

Jim helps people to settle, and introduces the meditation, leading into an extended period of silence. As the sound of the singing bowl ends the silence, the participants may be invited to share any insights received or may leave without comment in a quiet and relaxed way. But the sense of community is continued as they re-assemble at 'Square Coffee' for a drink

Occasionally, other members will lead and at two sessions, we have been



privileged to settle to the improvised music of professional musician, Simon Beck.

Sessions are relayed to people, near and far, who are unable to attend in person and are recorded for use by anyone later in the week. A second weekend retreat is being planned for October.

Newcomers can be assured of a warm welcome – just turn up, no agenda, open-minded and awake to everything! No-one is an expert; we simply practise, practise, practise and learn together. There is no charge, but small donations cover costs.



At the core of Dunchurch Photographic Society, or DPS for short, is a friendly group of photo enthusiasts of all levels and abilities, whose objectives are taking great shots and welcoming and encouraging new members, regardless of their level of experience or what they use to take pictures.

DPS which was established in the mid-70s, is made up of members from all over the Rugby area. Between us we have a diversity of photographic specialities and interests. Whether it's portraiture, landscape, seascape, transport or sports photography you are keen to

> learn about, we are sure to have like-minded members who can help and give advice.


The weekly club meetings are in the heart of Dunchurch and run from autumn to spring. However we remain active during the summer months with local informal 'photowalk' meet ups. We usually finish off with a brief pub visit to talk about our experiences over a drink. Newcomers are

always welcome to join us.

Run by the members, we offer mentoring for novices, advice with technical issues such as camera settings, editing, printing and more. We have ses-

sions where we can try different genres of shooting (members only need to bring a camera along, as the additional equipment and props are provided). We can offer guidance relating to suitable

equipment and help you find the best deals. We have photo competitions and your images can be judged and critiqued by qualified photo experts. We have visits from specialist guest speakers and lecturers. Professional photographers inspire us with their own pictures, offering us guidance and advice.

# Reg Calvert

ate in 1961 I was about 16. All the kids then were either pop music mad or wannabee pop stars. It was then I first started hearing about this magic place Clifton Hall and some local musicians

going there to audition. About a year later, Reg Calvert secured his Wednesday night tenure of the Benn Hall and we started to see and hear it all in the flesh. It was a revelation. His bands were really good and there were usually about 5 on each Wednesday. Reg was keen for any local talent to audition. I spoke to him and found him to be very approachable. Everything gradually ramped up until I was in a proper band and we were fully under his management.

Reg cut a slightly strange figure. He would bowl into the Granada to watch his acts, throwing popcorn in the air and

catching it in his mouth. He always wore a 3 piece suit and carpet slippers!

His wife Dorothy loved Clifton Hall and went out of her way to keep the mortgage in good shape but by the start of 1966 she discovered that Reg had secretly hocked it up

to the eyeballs to fund Radio City. Although the radio station was doing well, they couldn't rescue Clifton Hall and it had to be sold. As a

result of this they ended up living in Macbeth Close on Woodlands. So, when Reg died later that year, Dorothy was able to have him buried in Dunchurch. As ever. we were just that bit late for his funeral. We were intending to follow the hearse but ended up rushing to Dunchurch, only a little late. It was as nice as funerals go under the strained circumstances. Apart from family, there were just a few show biz people there. His agent Terry King, some agency staff and I think we were the only full band there but his close friend David (Screaming Lord) Sutch was there with his dog. The afters were at the Thatched Cottage. Away from

> performing, David Sutch was a quiet thoughtful person and I left the Thatched Cottage for a while to accompany him

The final resting place of Reg Calvert, who was shot and killed by a former owner of an offshore radio station and later acquitted of his murder



walking his dog around The Square, quietly chatting.

A lot of years later, Reg's widow Dorothy died and despite having lived in Tile Hill Village and Nuneaton, Dorothy was walked into Dunchurch in a lovely white horse drawn hearse and buried with Reg. He was after all the love of her life, as she was his.

A great deal has been written about Reg's life. He was forever coming up with madcap schemes to court publicity and was regarded by the established music biz as a maverick. There was even a tenuous link via David Sutch, to the Sex Pistols. Reg would have loved their antics

with one big exception. He never swore. His lasting legacies are the disciplines he installed into his bands and musicians such that most of those still alive are still performing. He also persuaded David Sutch to stand for parliament. R.I.P. a great man and his wife, resting in St Peters graveyard.



# Halifax Bomber Update

n 2019, at the 75th anniversary commemorations of the Halifax MZ920 crash in Dunchurch, we were supported by the Air Cadets of 29F Squadron Rugby.

In that same year, the squadron was given the components of an aircraft (Skyranger) by the British Model Aircraft Association (BMAA) for them to build and fly. After that it would be handed back to the BMAA for sale.

That build is coming to an end and the aircraft will be taken to Sywell Aerodrome in Northamptonshire for test flying before it will be sold by the BMAA. The actual handover, despite the aircraft not being complete, was done at the RAF Cosford Airshow on the 8th of June 2024. Following the handover, the aircraft was moved back to Rugby for completion.

You may wonder why it has taken so long for the Air Cadets (six of them, under supervision) to complete? At first Covid lockdowns made it impossible for

the Air Cadets to meet.

Now when they do meet, which is twice weekly for a couple of hours, they have to do their square bashing and other jobs before they can spend time on the aircraft.

Earlier this year I was contacted by their Com-

manding Officer asking if I would agree to an idea by one of the Cadets to register the aircraft as G-WEPW, these being the first letters of the surnames of the Halifax crew that perished in 1944. I was more that happy to give the idea my stamp of approval. The UK registration of civil aircraft always starts with the letter G, that being for Geoffrey Grant, fortunate, but also fitting. The others are W (Wood), E (Ewing), P (Parsons) and W (Ward). The aircraft also carries the 29F Squadron Badge, the RCAF 434 Squadron badge and a plaque in the cockpit (just visible in the picture) of the Halifax crash main details.

The workmanship, which is checked locally but also by the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) is outstanding and a credit to the six Air Cadets who realised the project.

It is hoped that the new owner will keep the aircraft as it is delivered, in honour of our Halifax boys. Once the test flying starts, I will take some pictures and report back in a later issue of the magazine

# 1st Dunchurch Scouts - Jim Reid

The 1st Dunchurch Scout Group was founded in December 1950 and in 1995, the group found themselves homeless when their hut was demolished as part of the redevelopment of the Dun Cow Hotel.

The scout committee of the day, headed by Chairman Jim Reid, faced the mammoth task of trying to find a new home and raising the considerable funds to build

it. Four hardworking years later, the new scout building in Done Cerce Close was officially opened

on the 19th of September 1999 by Jim and Angus-Critchley Waring, the grandson of Lord Waring, who was a founding member of the scouts movement and past Dunchurch resident. The following month, Jim was awarded the Chief Scout's



Commendation for Good Service in recognition of his tireless work to bring the new build to fruition.

Sadly, Jim died in April of this year, just short of the 25th anniversary of the official opening but he has left a considerable legacy for the village and a lasting tribute to his hard work and that of his supporting committee.



# Second World War Memorial Book

n St Peter's Church is a memorial book for men from the Parish of Dunchurch & Thurlaston who were killed in WW2. It was presented by Mrs Mary Miller in memory of her husband, Colonel Alexander Miller, Royal Artillery & RAOC, who lived from 1912 to 1992.

It opens with bible verses from John, Chapter 15:12,13, 'This is my commandment: that you love one another as I have loved you. Greater love hath no man than this, that he lay down his life for his friends.'

Along with the dates on which they died, there are photographs of these men:
Edward Henry Colledge, Thomas Sullivan, Albert Packer, Denis Roy Miles, Stanley Brett, Desmond Mitchell, Peter Joseph Gray, Rowland James Borton, Alfred Matthews, Arthur Bernard Commons, Joseph John Hirons, Donald Price and

William George Walden.

However, also named in the book are Donald Bell, Clifford Fulsher, William Sims and John Henry Warren, but sadly there are no photographs of them. We find that Donald served in the Royal Engineers and died on 29th September 1947 and John in the RAF, dying on 19th September 1939.

If anyone could supply photographs of these four men, or dates of death for Clifford and William, Chris Sarson would be grateful to receive them at St Peter's, so that the memorial can be more complete.



There has been a church on the site of St Peter's for 1000 years, and in medieval times the churchyard hosted the lively village market until it got too lively! The two churchwardens (Celia Jones and I), the Parochial Church Council and all the helpers mentioned above regard it as a privilege to be part of its ongoing history.


