at any time throughout the year and a recent report by the Office for National Statistics found that around a quarter of adults reported they felt lonely always, often or at least, some of the time.

For those who are not on social media. please be aware there are a range of organisations in Dunchurch that offer companionship and social interaction through a variety of events, and several hold coffee mornings where refreshments are provided at minimal cost. For example:

Questions to all Dunchurch Village magazine readers from Ann Coomber, Chair of Dunchurch Parish Council:


- Are we making best use of this ancient institution enshrined in law?

he Parish Assembly is the name given to the annual gathering together of all the groups and organisations who contribute to making Dunchurch such a great place to live.

I have been amazed by the amount of volunteering that goes on in Dunchurch. Almost everyone I meet is involved in some kind of a voluntary role contributing to making Dunchurch an interesting and caring community. Everywhere I go

I find people giving freely of their time and energy to help the life of the village.



Volunteers in Dunchurch all have the same aim, to improve Dunchurch as a place where people live, work and play. To bring all parts of our community closer together – the Assembly meeting can be a showcase for all this but also a place for focusing opinion about anything that affects the well-being of our community and to bring it to bear on the responsible authority. It's a place to get to know your community and all it has to offer for improving quality of life and community well-being.

I've been researching the history of the Parish Assembly. I've discovered it is a tradition dating back to Anglo-Saxon times when it was that Parishes provided a means for people to come together to govern themselves. Local Parish Councils did not exist. All local decision making was carried out by meetings of the whole community taking place in any available large building. So, the annual



Parish Assembly here in Dunchurch is a legacy from the middle ages which still provides a form of direct democracy uncommon in Britain. On this one occasion only the elected Parish Councillors are themselves present as residents and are therefore of equal standing to all other electors within the meeting.

The Parish Assembly is therefore a Public Meeting required by law (Local Government Act 1972) to which all residents of the Parish are invited and is held at least once a year between 1st

March and 1st June.

In 2025 I intend to call the Assembly on the first Monday in March (3rd March). The law says it can't be held before 6pm so it has to be at a family unfriendly evening time unfortunately. But I hope to offer some refreshments and enable a social atmosphere. Information about the meeting will be available on the Parish Council website: www.dunchurchparishcouncil.gov.uk and on the notice-boards on The Green and on our boundary on the Coventry Road in Cawston.

Will you join me?

he greatest threat to our planet is our belief that someone else will save it! Could you be that someone else to help? I've recently attended a workshop to prepare a plan so we can act together to conserve our surroundings. As a Parish Councillor and avid lover of nature, I have become very concerned about preserving where we live. I think we all feel we have no control over what happens to our neighbourhoods but this workshop showed me we do have control and we can change things.

I'm prepared to put together a plan of action to avert these threats but I can't do it alone. What spurs me on is not just that we have lost half of our butterfly population this year, or
that we have lost the seven
buzzards that would fly over my allotments on Coventry Road helping to
control the rabbit population, but how
almost every plant and every animal is at
risk and nothing is being done. Driving
down Ashlawn Road reduces me to tears
to see that so much has been destroyed
and so unnecessarily. Is this really what
we are leaving for our children and
grandchildren?

We cannot stop developments but preparing this plan and the information it contains, can action the Environmental Legisaltion 'Every planning application must submit an ecological impact

Dunchurch Traffic Survey

s a Parish Council, we are acutely aware of the concern our fellow parishioners share around the volume and speed of traffic through Dunchurch.

Changes in behaviour, along with significant residential and commercial urbanisation, has had a huge impact in terms of safety, noise and pollution. With these concerns in mind, Dunchurch Parish Council, in partnership with Warwickshire County Council, arranged for a series of traffic speed and volume surveys during September – covering Coventry Road, Daventry Road, Rugby Road, Southam Road and Northampton Lane.

We are now in receipt of the survey data and, following a period of review, will look to promote discussions with all stakeholders around our options for traffic calming measures.

Tackling motorists who speed is critical, not just for our safety, but for the longterm preservation of our community. We, like you, firmly believe that being able to navigate safely through our village should be our right - not our privilege.



Dunchurch Allotments

unchurch Allotment Association exists to support the allotment community and was formed in 2011. Since its inception, the role of the Association has developed and expanded, but its core mission remains to support members in their passion for gardening. This includes providing gardening supplies and services, as well as maintaining

and improving the site. In recent years, the Association has also engaged with the local community by organizing fun and engaging activities for families, such as the scarecrow festivals, acorn houses and Wildlife Wander events.

The allotment site is owned by the Dunchurch and Thurlaston Community Trust, to which plot holders sign a lease

and pay their annual rent. Increasingly, the Association has taken on the responsibility of managing the site with the support of the Trust. This includes tasks such as maintaining boundary hedges, improving pathways, and clearing rubbish from untended plots. The issue of untended plots presents the biggest challenge to the Association.

When tenants take on a plot, they sign a tenancy agreement, one condition of which states that plots must be 'kept clean, in a good state of fertility and cultivation, and free from noxious weeds.' However, some plots inevitably become neglected and overgrown, for reasons such as ill health, family breakup, work pressures, personal circumstances, or loss of interest. The challenge for both the Trust and the Association is determining when

action should be taken to request that a tenant relinquish their plot. Some allotment sites are strict in their inspection and enforcement procedures; for instance, one local site requires that 80% of a plot be under cultivation.

At Dunchurch Allotments, inspections are carried out jointly by the Trust and the Association, with both parties agreeing on the actions that should be taken regarding unkept and uncultivated plots. The specific circumstances of plot holders are always considered. Initially, contact is made to suggest that the plot needs attention, and in some cases, tenants are encouraged to downsize to a smaller plot. The tone of the communication becomes progressively more direct, and if no action is taken by the plot holder, termination of the tenancy is enacted.

Both the Trust and the Association aim to take a sympathetic and lenient approach to inspections, balancing this with the obligations that plot holders agree to.



Halifax Bomber - a tragedy remembered

n the 14th of October, it was exactly 80 years to the minute since Halifax MZ920 lost its battle with fire and flight and at 11am on that day this year, we commemorated this with a crowd in attendance that made me feel quite emotional.

A brief 20-minute service was conducted by vicar Malcolm Garratt during which he led in prayers and church warden Veronica read the poem High Flight by John Gillespie Magee. Malcolm also quoted Royal Canadian Air Force Chaplain John Phillip Lardie from a 1944 speech to two RCAF squadrons at RAF Middleton St George in North Yorkshire. It was a very poignant speech and I want to share this with you:

'Three thousand miles across a hunted ocean they came, wearing on the shoulder of their tunics the treasured name, "Canada," telling the world their origin. Young men and women they were, some still in their teens, fashioned by their Maker to love, not to kill, but proud and earnest in their mission to stand, and if it had to be, to die,

ety stood at the crossroads and civilization itself was under siege,

the Royal Canadian Air Force was there to fill the breach and help give humanity the victory. And all those who had a part in it will have left to posterity a legacy of honour, of courage, and of valour that time can never despoil.'

My thanks, also on behalf of the Ewing, Wood and George families, goes to Malcolm and Veronica for making the service special and to FODS and those people who came out to support us and be a part of this remembrance.





unchurch is a parish, comprising the two hamlets of Toft and Thurlaston, in the same Hundred as Rugby (Knightlow): the village is two miles s. by w. of that town; and, before the opening of the railway, was a place of considerable thoroughfare, being situate on the great north road. A court of requests is held here every three weeks, and the village is a polling station at the election of members to represent the northern division of the county. The parish church of St. Peter is a handsome and curious edifice, with a square embattled tower; the south porch has a fine Norman arch. The living is a vicarage in the patronage of the Bishop of Lichfield and Coventry. There is a place of worship for Baptists. The charities comprise a free grammar school, founded and endowed in 1707, by Thomas Boughton; an apprenticeship fund by the same benefactor; and six alms houses, for three poor men and three poor women, founded by Thomas Newcombe in 1695. The parish contained, in 1831, 1310 inhabitants; and in 1841 a decreased number of 1078.




Dunchurch Boughton C of E Infants Academy and Nursery

e had a busy first half term and at the time of writing it is October half term and looking back, it is amazing to see how much we have managed to squeeze into the past eight weeks! The children settled quickly into their new year groups and became immersed in their learning. The year groups throughout school carried out learning through the following topics: nursery and reception focused on 'Who am I?' and 'MarvellousMe', year one learnt through the topic of 'I am an artist' and year two investigated the topic of 'To infinity and beyond'. We received support from the local community with the children learning firsthand from Rugby Fire Service, The Air Ambulance Service and the Road Safety Team. We supported charities close to our hearts on World Heart Day, raising money for Birmingham Children's Hospital who have supported several of our families and Our Jay Foundation. We also wore yellow and promoted the importance of mental health on World Mental Health Day.

We have further topics and school trips planned including a whole school theatre trip to see The Smeds and the Smoos. Year two will visit St John's Museum as part of their learning about Victorians,




