Traffic survey

urther to our traffic and speeding article in December's village magazine, Dunchurch Parish Council (DPC) is now able to share the results of the surveys carried out over a consecutive two-week period in September 2024.

The surveys were commissioned by DPC and performed by Warwickshire County Council on Coventry Road, Daventry Road, Northampton Lane, Southam Road and Rugby Road. In summary:


- A total of 533,981 vehicles across the five roads were recorded during the two-week survey
- Of those 254,049 vehicles, or (48%) were recorded doing 30mph and above
- I,852 vehicles were recorded travelling over 50mph

Whilst the Parish Council has limited powers to authorise speed prevention measures, which are ultimately the responsibility of WCC and the Police, we will use the data to promote our concerns and push for the implementation of meaningful and lasting measures to improve safety and driving behaviours throughout the parish.

We can also confirm that the data has been shared with Rugby Councillors John Keeling, Jon Bennett and Jill Simpson-Vince and Councillor Dale Keeling for Warwickshire County Council. In addition, the DPC will be submitting the data to Warwickshire Road Safety Partnership Central Reporting System (CRS) as we look to get support in making our community safer.

Tackling motorists who speed is critical, not just for our safety, but for the long-

term preservation of our community. The DPC, like our fellow parishioners, firmly believe that being able to navigate safely through our village should be our right – not our privilege.

Beloved parish tree felled for safety reasons

unchurch residents may have noticed the removal of one of the village's cherished trees recently. While such decisions are never made lightly, the Parish Council acted to ensure the safety of everyone in the community.

The red oak, which stood proudly on

Stocks Green, was found to be infected with meripilus giganteus, a fungus that can severely weaken trees by attacking their root systems. Known as the giant polypore, this fungus can make trees unstable, increasing the risk of them falling without warning. After careful inspection by tree experts, it was determined that the

tree posed a potential danger to nearby residents and visitors.

"We know how much this tree meant. to our community," said Councillor Coomber. "It's always heartbreaking to lose a tree that has been part of our village for so long. However, the safety of our residents must come first, and leaving the tree in place would have been too great a risk."

The Parish Council worked with tree experts to explore every possible option before the decision was made. Unfortunately, by the time the fungus's fruiting bodies are visible, the damage to the tree's structure is often too advanced to reverse.

Plans are already being developed to plant a new tree in the same area, choosing a species that will thrive and provide shade, beauty, and habitat for

> wildlife for generations to come.

"We want to reassure has been lost," added Councillor Coomber. "The new tree will honour the memory of its predecessor while continuing to make Dunchurch a green and welcoming place for all."




space where everyone feels inspired, connected, and valued.

VE Day celebrations in Dunchurch

he New Year has arrived and the countdown to the Dunchurch VE Day celebrations begins.

In the December 2024 edition of the magazine, we outlined that Dunchurch Parish Council was working with FODS and other groups within the village to lay on an ambitious event to celebrate the end of World War II. The date for everyone's diaries is Saturday 10th May.

So, what's happening exactly? Put simply, Dunchurch is going back in time, 80 years to be precise, to celebrate a turning point in British and indeed world history, the end of one of the worst wars the world has ever seen (although many brave British service men and women were still paying a heavy price as the fight drew to a conclusion in the Pacific).

To commemorate and celebrate this occasion there will be WW2 tanks, 25 ponder artillery pieces, jeeps and half tracks from the Normandy campaign, a full arsenal of WW2 weapons including Bren guns and Lee Enfield rifles and much more armour.

We have permission to close the whole village square down for the day and road restrictions will be in place. There will be plenty of WW2 music, Dunchurch Voices, Dunchurch Band, singers and an

excellent show (repeated several times) loosely based on *Dad's Army* and stories of the time. A piper will be there to provide



super bagpipe music and the music and shows will go on into the night in the Dunchurch Social Club. We will have maypole dancing from the children of a village school and the Mayor of Rugby will kindly be opening proceedings. There will also be some great historical insights about Dunchurch in the 1940s.

Our wonderful WI ladies will be serving teas, and there will be hog roasts provided by the Huntsman Carvery and fish and chip meals all afternoon from Dunchurch Fish Bar. Both village coffee shops will be open to provide further refreshments and the Dunchurch Social Club has a licence to serve beer and wine throughout the day – in other words, there will be something for everyone. Oh, and we nearly forgot to mention that the Kilsby ice cream van will be with us all afternoon in The Square.

The programme is well advanced but still evolving and it promises to be a special day. Look out for more communications in March and April and join us on Saturday 10th May for what should be a truly memorable occasion.

Dunchurch Allotment Communal Orchard

his year, our communal orchard, named Hodgy's orchard, celebrates its 10th anniversary. It was planted in an area of the allotment site that had become overgrown with brambles and was unusable as an allotment plot due to shading from large trees.

At the time, it was decided to plant heritage fruit varieties, which were purchased from Bernwode Fruit Trees, a fruit tree nursery in Ludgershall, Buckinghamshire. This nursery is dedicated not only to preserving historic tree fruit varieties but also to identifying and reviving those thought to have been lost. When Simon and I visited Bernwode in 2015, the passionate owners, Derek and Judy Tolman, were busy in the greenhouse grafting scions (the part of the

plant to be propagated) onto rootstocks (the plant's root system).

Bernwode's catalogue boasts about 600 apple varieties out of an estimated 2,000 in the UK. During our visit, we left with approximately twenty saplings, including a few pear trees and a couple of plum varieties.

Because apples do not breed true, planting an apple seed will not get you a tree much like its parent. Instead, for thousands of years, people have used grafting to hang on to apple varieties they like, taking a cutting from an old tree and growing it onto a new set of roots. That means that each apple tree is a clone of a long-ago progenitor. Some of these fixed genotypes are presumably as old as the Roman period. The Romans,

when they invaded the British Isles two millennia ago, are said to have brought domesticated apples with them.

Grafting is a widely used method for propagating apples and other top fruits for several reasons.

Grafted trees typically produce fruit within 2–3 years, whereas trees grown from seed may take 5–10 years. Additionally, grafting allows growers to combine

desirable traits, such as improved disease resistance. Choosing the right rootstock influences a tree's growth rate, size, and overall health. Our trees were grafted onto M9 rootstock, which produces dwarf-sized bushes.

The term 'heritage' or 'heirloom' apples refers to varieties that originated at least fifty years ago or more. These apple varieties have been carefully preserved and passed down through generations. In contrast to the hybrid apples commonly seen in markets, which combine attributes from multiple varieties, heirloom varieties remain in their original, natural forms. By planting heritage trees, we help preserve these unique varieties that might otherwise be lost.

Each variety we planted has its own history, with many dating back hundreds of years. For example:

- Gilliflower: A culinary/dessert apple and one of the oldest English varieties, dating back to 1629. It was grown from Cumberland to Kent.
- Lemon Pippin: A dessert/culinary apple thought to be English or Norman in origin and known to exist in England before 1685. In the 18th and 19th centuries, it was dried for tarts

and also enjoyed as a dessert apple.

 Nancy Lee: A dessert/culinary apple that likely originated as a 'wilding' from a discarded core or dropped apple. It was adopted by Dr. Alexandra Freeman in Oxfordshire and named Nancy Lee after her grandmother.

Not all the trees we planted ten years ago have survived the challenges of time. Some succumbed to extreme weather patterns, while others, like the Ethelbert Oakenful apple, suffered structural damage. Last year, the weight of its abundant fruit caused its extended branches to split back to the main trunk.

Looking ahead, our intention is to replace the trees that have died with young heritage saplings, ensuring the orchard continues to thrive for future generations.

Foraging 1: Cleavers



am a Dunchurch resident and local forager and I'm passionate about rewilding and rediscovering lost ancient wisdom and connection with our beautiful local environment.

Cleavers, sticky weed, goosegrass, sticky willy, bedstraw,

– most of us
will be familiar
with this native
annual 'weed'
which grows
abundantly around



Lush and green early in the year, signalling the first signs of spring, it grows tall and straggly, clinging, climbing, and clambering up other plants as the summer progresses.

You may view cleavers as just a garden pest or a pet owner's nuisance, spending hours detangling seeds from dog's fur. But did you know that all parts above ground are entirely edible and thought to be rich in vitamin C and antioxidants such as flavonoids? Once used as a pot

herb, early spring leaves and stems can be chopped and used in stir frys, soups and stews (don't worry the hook-like bristles soften when cooked!) It belongs to the

coffee family and its seeds can be dried and ground to make a mildly caffeinated 'cleavers coffee'. Its dark red roots were once used as a dye.

Cleavers are also a valuable wildlife plant providing food for the caterpillars of many butterfly and moth species including the barred

straw moth and the hummingbird hawk moth. It's loved by rabbits and guinea pigs and can provide a good alternative and free greens for their diet.

In traditional home remedies it was used as a cleansing herb thought to have mild diuretic properties, stimulating the lymphatic system and flushing out built up toxins and pollutants. Studies have shown it to be an immunostimulant.

In symbolism cleavers are thought of as the herb of connection to others and is a cooling herb linked to the water element.


In folklore it was believed that if you drink cleavers water three times a day for nine weeks you will become so beautiful everyone will fall in love with you instantly!

Perhaps reading this you have learnt a few new things about this amazing common weed. So, next time you come across it on a stroll or in the garden, I

invite you to reach out; touch it, smell it, taste it. Perhaps you won't be so quick to pull it out of the garden when weeding and maybe even consider a wild corner to help sustain and support wildlife. I hope you see its magical beauty in a completely new light, as I have.

Cleavers spring tonic

Firstly, make sure you are 100% sure of your identification. Pick a large handful of cleavers. Wash thoroughly then add to a jug or bottle of water with a slice of lemon. Leave to infuse overnight in the






A love letter from the past

Rugby Dec 21/68

My Darling Polly,

Just a few lines to you hoping they will find you quite well as it leaves me quite well at present. My own darling beauty I came to meet you on Monday and thought of seeing your pretty face but did not. I suppose you did not come. I came to meet you with a light heart but left with a heavy one. My darling pretty dear I will come and meet you on Thursday at the same time if you can come. If not I hope to see your pretty face on Friday if you can't come and meet me on Thursday. I will come up by the plots and by your house at three o'clock. My own dear Polly I enjoyed my walk with you on Sunday last very much indeed for I do love you with all my heart and when you tell me that I go with and one else it griefs me very much. My Darling Polly please when you write to me will you tell me whether your father said anything to you for going with me. When I got back they asked me whether I had seen you and had a walk with you and how you was and I told them that you sent your love to them and they thought it was very kind of you to think of them and they said they would be very happy to see you any time that you come. I hope you won't forget to call on Tuesday if you come over. My darling beauty you soon had another young man after I left you. I don't think that you love me much as you would not talk with so many. But my darling I will freely forgive you it.

My Darling Polly I don't know that I have more to say this time so I must conclude with all my very very best love to you if you will except it. Je suis your ever loving friend.

A village turned black

(Phyllis Edmondson 1900-1996)

n Wednesday January 3rd 1935, at 6pm, a lorry containing 22 barrels of lampblack entered Dunchurch. As it. slowed down opposite our house, The Old Bell Inn, its front axle broke and friction with the road caused the carburettor to ignite. Fire spread to the petrol tank which exploded and sheets of flame shot 20 feet into the air.

One by one the barrels of lampblack rolled slowly off the lorry onto the road where they too caught fire, burning with such intensity that the whole road surface was soon ablaze. Fortunately, the driver managed to scramble from his cab unhurt and telephoned the Fire Brigade who came at speed from Rugby.

Meanwhile, the smoke from the lorry and barrels had turned into a dense black swirling fog with lumps of soot and burning wax falling like satanic snow all around the village. Black greasy powder penetrated every window and door and the heat cracked glass panes and blistered paint. Water from the brigade's hoses filled the gutters with waves of

black powder which swept like the tide down the street. A large crowd had gathered but soon they were covered from head to foot with lampblack.

After two hours the Fire Brigade returned to Rugby leaving us all to try and clean up all the mess although that took many days of washing and scrubbing.

One interesting result of the fire was that the ivy covering the front of our house became scorched and had to be pulled off. Underneath it was revealed an old sign painted on the wall: BELL INN. POST HORSES and alongside this hung a metal 'Fire Mark' indicating that in its coaching days the house had been insured by the Sun company.

When, four years later, the house was hit by a bomb, lampblack could still be seen around the splintered window frames.

'Luckily, Mr Birch the lorry driver managed to escape his vehicle without suffering any injury and a car following behind the lorry had to be smartly pushed to safety from the flaming road.

The Rugby Fire Brigade was called and used both water and chemical extinguishers to help put out the blaze. Two policemen driving nearby hurried to the scene and organised the road to be blocked and all traffic diverted.

Needless to say, there were black footprints in homes and local businesses

for some time'.

NB: Lampblack, made by burning oil in a lamp to produce a finely-powdered black soot, was used chiefly as a pigment for paints, enamels and printing inks.





t was with a profound shock that I realised that 1st January was the 25th anniversary of my retirement. I had not thought much about what I would do in retirement but since I had so many community commitments, I just carried on for most of the next 20 years, gradually shedding the more onerous responsibilities in favour of continuing village interests.

In my career and voluntary work, there was nothing really to suggest I become an 'author' in my eighties. However, I read a piece in the local paper about

'The Queen's Canopy' and that quickly morphed into The Dunchurch Oak Line. With lots of sponsorship and support from FODS, the DFG and other village groups, the original ten oaks were planted in a wonderful crescent on The Heath and soon supplemented by The King Charles III Coronation Oak Thereafter was




