Before the village hall was built, the Dunchurch Festival Group held weeklong events leading up to fete day, utilising a marquee erected on the village hall sports field and hiring toilets.

Following an incident of marquee vandalism which resulted in a repair bill of £500, an overnight security rota was drawn up and two members of the group would take it in turns to sleep over each night, and by day a willing volunteer would sit in the marquee as security. However, during an off-site lunch break, a landrover drove into the carpark, hitched up the toilets and removed/stole them! I was secretary of the DFG at the time and was given the

job of contacting the owner and informing him of the theft. He was not amused and demanded £10,000 compensation.

The police were informed and an appeal was made in the *Rugby Telegraph* for information. Someone from Coventry Road came forward having seen the landrover with toilets being driven away, and was able to give a full description of the vehicle.

Ian Vaughan, our Treasurer, arranged for replacement toilets and I called the 'aggrieved' owner telling him that as it was now a police incident, he needed to give a statement, and that someone had been able to supply a description of the landrover removing the toilets. Only then did

the owner tell me that the unit was back in his yard, claiming he had taken them back to 'teach us a lesson in security' and refusing to return either the toilets or refund our money.

Don Townend, who was our Chair at the time, Ian our Treasurer and I used the small claims court to recover the money that was rightfully ours and after questioning the owner, the judge found in our favour instructing a full refund and expenses. Needless to say, we walked out of court with a spring in our step and it will be no surprise to many, we

headed straight to a pub to celebrate.

A lot of hard work goes into organising the village fete and as you can see, it is not always plain sailing. It can definitely bring a few sleepless nights whether you are sleeping in a draughty marquee or not!

Fete day 2026 will be the DFG's 50th anniversary and it is heart-warming to see that despite all the ups and downs, the group is still going strong and raising money for the benefit of the village. Long may it continue.

Dunchurch Pantomaniacs, 35 years of fun!



AUTUMN ROUND UP

Find out what we've been up to since the summer, working to give Dunchurch a voice on the planning developments in and around our village

- Hosted an afternoon tea with Councillors Michael Moran, Leader of the Council and Louise Robinson, Portfolio holder responsible for Growth & Investment to discuss the Local Plan and suggested use of Brownfield sites as well as historical over-build in Dunchurch.
- Attended Taylor Wimpey 'The Lodgings' exhibition and lodged our concerns over the proposal being brought forward ahead of any the South West Rugby infrastructure being in place.
- Connected with The Ramblers Association over protecting Public Rights of Way and Warwickshire Wildlife Trust about protecting our green spaces.
- Connected with the Allotments Association over concerns that the South West Rugby Masterplan does not allocate the legal right to allotment space.
- Held a **Family Walk & Foraging** event to highlight the demise of our green space in Dunchurch by Homes England.
- Produced an **18 page response to RBC planners** about environmental and historical implications of the South West Rugby development on the unique character of Dunchurch.
- Campaigned to rethink the **felling of [Class A] oak trees** on Alwyn Road.
- Responded to the **total decimation of hedges and trees** in Dunchurch in readiness for the Homestead Link road
- **Won some landscaping amendments** in the planning approval of Homes England's Substation

Dunchurch Allotments celebrates Apple Day

October is a special month for allotment and gardening groups across the country, as it marks the celebration of Apple Day – an annual event that shines a spotlight on the importance of apples in British life and traditions. It encourages communities to discover and appreciate the rich variety of apples grown throughout the UK. From their introduction by the Romans to the flourishing orchards of today, Britain now boasts over 2,500 apple varieties, each with its own distinctive flavour, appearance, and culinary use.

This year, Apple Day was held at Dunchurch Allotments on Sunday 26th October, where a large gathering of families created a lively and enthusiastic atmosphere filled with apple-themed fun. One of the most popular attractions

was the scratter and apple press, where children and parents alike delighted in extracting their own fresh apple juice. Families were also invited to make their own apple crumble, choosing a favourite topping to take home and bake. Demand for this activity was so great that the large pan of pre-prepared apple filling was soon emptied!

Apple printing proved another creative highlight. Using freshly cut apples or lino-cut coated with ink, participants printed apple-shaped designs onto card – with many quickly mastering the technique and proudly displaying their artwork.

Dunchurch Allotments is home to around twenty varieties of apple trees, many of them heritage types. Visitors were eager to sample these lesser-known varieties, some with wonderfully

unusual names. The clear favourite of the day was Violette – a dark-skinned apple known in France as early as 1628 and introduced to England later that century, named for its violet bloom. A close second was Ethelbert Oakenfull, a variety originally discovered growing at a disused Italian POW camp in Welwyn Garden City.

For adults, the apple peeling competition provided plenty of entertainment, as contestants competed to produce the longest continuous peel. The winner proudly took home a large pumpkin prize. Children were equally captivated by the manual apple peeling machine, which peeled, cored, and sliced the fruit with a simple turn of the handle – and the leftover peels proved a surprisingly



popular snack!

Adding to the fun, a children's trail around the allotment site featured twelve imaginative animals crafted from wellington boots, kindly loaned by Susan Watt. From cows

to ladybirds, frogs to butterflies, there was a delightful array of creatures to discover. A tempting range of homemade cakes and pies, lovingly baked by allotment members, rounded off the afternoon perfectly.

After such a successful day – and with so many apples enjoyed – we're confident that Dunchurch will be one of the healthiest villages around. After all, as the saying goes, 'an apple a day keeps the doctor away!'

This original script, written especially for us by John Dacombe, was based on some fact with added humour and plenty of invented intrigue as murder was committed at the Old Lion Inn, Dunchurch. Over a meal, the audience were able to 'digest' the plot and a question-and-answer session followed as they interrogated the actors to try and work out who committed murder. Whilst the play was scripted, the questions at the end were not and there were some pretty searching questions to navigate. It seems we are a community of Miss Marples and Hercule Poirots! Who knew?

This was a happy collaboration of like-minded folk and we hope it has enabled

Hari Clark crowned World Champion in Lake Lipno, Czech Republic

We first reported Dunchurch teenager Hari's amazing sailing achievements in our September 2024 issue. This year he has continued to win international championships. This is his story:

This summer, I was lucky enough to win the Tera Sport World Championships, making me the first sailor to be a world champion in the Topper and RS Tera (two classes of junior sailing boats that are very different, so not many sailors try to do both). The Topper was designed to be put on a car roof rack, so it is curved, aerodynamic, and so looks rather like a car roof box, whereas the Tera is more of a traditional 'boat-shaped boat'. However, they are both single-handed boats, meaning that I sail them on my own without any other crew.

I was introduced to sailing quite late and by accident, as no-one in my family has a sailing background. My parents put my name down for a learn-to-sail course at Draycote four years ago as something to do for a few days during the summer holidays. Whilst it was fun, I only really started sailing on my own about three years ago, doing a few local races in a Topper. In the spring of last year I won my first national events in a Topper 4.2 (Topper with a 4.2m² sail), and then went

to the Topper Worlds in Mar Menor, Spain, in the summer. Much to everyone's surprise (not least mine!) I won the event. Even better, when I got back to the UK I won the Nationals too, making me the first ever sailor to be both world and national champion in a Topper 4.2.

About a year ago I switched boat to an RS Tera Sport, with the objective of achieving another first – to win a world championship in a Tera (no-one has gained both Topper and Tera world titles). This involved training longer and harder than before. As well as sailing, there were regular gym sessions, and often I would go for a long run or bike ride before school to build up aerobic fitness. In the run-up to the Tera Worlds I won a National event in spring, but came second in another later event, which was a bit of a worry (though I did break a mast then, which didn't help). Also, heading to the Worlds, there are many unknowns. You do not know who will be coming from

other countries, or how good they are, or if the weather will be favourable. The venue (Lake Lipno in the Czech Republic) was renowned for light winds – not my favourite sailing condition – so I practiced a lot in similar conditions beforehand.

To get to Lake Lipno we had to drive around 800 miles and take an overnight ferry, but eventually we arrived towing a trailer with all our sailing equipment and boat on top. I knew it would be tough to win, as we discovered that I was going to be up against Yevhenii Kuzmenko from Ukraine who won the event in 2023 and was runner-up in 2024. Nevertheless, I managed to get six first places in the 12 races, allowing me to win with one race to spare – which is quite unusual. Also, I was really happy to be a double world champion! Afterwards, I tried to win the Tera Sport national championships but lost out by one point, coming second in a fleet of 66 boats at Paignton. I was still pretty pleased as the fleet only managed five races in really rough seas and I lost to a talented specialist sea sailor. (Note to self: practice more on the sea this year!)

This all happened a few months ago, and I've already moved onto the next sailing challenge(s) which are to compete in two world championships next year in larger sail sizes (Topper 5.3 and Tera Pro rigs). To this end, the training will be longer and harder than ever before over this winter, and my boats are being re-rigged and pre-

pared for the challenges ahead. Ultimately, I want to move into an Olympic sailing class such as the ILCA, but this is still a way off owing to my relatively small size, but I'm working on that too!

I'd really like to thank all of the people who have helped to make this possible. In particular, the amazing coaches at Draycote, and everyone else there who helped to prepare me and my boat for this endeavour. Also thanks to my parents for their time and support. I could not do it without them. Lastly, I would very much appreciate hearing from anyone/any companies who might be interested in advertising or media opportunities in return for sponsorship to help with sailing challenges in 2026 and beyond.

How to help wildlife in Dunchurch this winter

Food – Keep bird tables and hanging feeders topped up with calorie-rich supplies like fat balls, peanuts and sunflower hearts to help birds replenish the extra energy they use to keep warm. Don't forget to clean the feeders regularly to avoid infections spreading.

Water – Have a small pond or keep a birdbath or

shallow dish topped up for thirsty wildlife.

When the surface freezes defrost it by carefully pouring warm water over it. For ponds, try floating a ball in the water to maintain an air

hole for frogs and newts that may be hibernating in the depths.



Shelter – make a log or stick pile to give shelter for beetles and frogs. Leave piles of leaves because they make cosy homes for hedgehogs, frogs, and insects. Don't burn bonfires without checking because bonfire piles can hide sleeping or hibernating hedgehogs. Winter is a good time to give existing nest boxes a good clean or to put up new ones in preparation for the birds' breeding season in spring.

As plants die back in the garden delay the traditional tidy up and choose to leave some of the seed heads standing. The seeds will provide food for birds and small mammals, and hollow stems and intricate seed heads are valuable shelter for overwintering insects like ladybirds.

Foraging 4: Five Reasons to Forage

As we settle into the quiet of the winter, the bounty of the hedgerows and woods is scarcer and foraging is a little slower. I've been reflecting on what foraging means to me and the ways it has enriched my life. It's not just about collecting wild food, it's about slowing down and noticing the little wonders around us.

Here are five reasons I'd like to share in how you could benefit from stepping outside and embracing our local wild.

1. Connect with the seasons

Foraging tunes you into the seasonal rhythms. Every berry, leaf or mushroom tells a story of the time and place it grows. Notice how the landscape changes even when the trees are bare and the frost sparkles on the ground.

2. Get outdoors and move

A foraging walk is gentle exercise with purpose. Fresh air, light and the thrill of spotting hidden treasures in the wild, keeping both body and mind active. You don't need to go far, there is so much to be found even in the church grounds.

3. Explore new flavours

Wild food invites curiosity. From

tangy sorrel to earthy mushrooms, you'll taste the seasons like never before. My recent culinary experiment was acorn coffee!



4. Mindful moments

Foraging slows you down. Notice textures, scents and colours. Each step becomes a mini meditation in nature. I have personally noticed a heightened sense of smell since beginning my foraging journey, smelling the horseradish or garlic mustard before I see it!

5. Protect and respect nature

The more you love wild places, the more you want to protect them. Foraging fosters care for both yourself and the environment, remembering to tread lightly, taking only what we need.

Even in these darker months, there is so much to notice, taste and enjoy. Look out for the first tender nettles and cleavers which can be turned into a hearty



nutritious soup or winter tonic.

Wrap up warm, step outside and see what winter has to offer.



Turnpike Roads in the Dunchurch Area

By **Freda Bennett**

Some of you may remember Terry John, who used to teach at Dunchurch Junior School. Terry gave me two boxes of information he had gathered about Dunchurch. Terry's boxes are like a treasure trove.

I came across the following in one of these boxes giving 'Yet more information on Dunchurch roads!'

'An Act for Amending, Widening, Altering, and Keeping in Repair, the road from Dunchurch to Southam, in the County of Warwick.

'Whereas the road leading from Dunchurch, in the County of Warwick, to the Town of Southam, is in some parts only a Bridle Road, and in other parts narrow, circuitous, and incommodious, and also very much out of Repair, and cannot be effectually widened, amended, altered, and kept in Repair by the Ordinary Course of Law.

'May it therefore please Your MAJESTY. And be it Enacted by the KING's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, That the said Road shall

be made, amended, widened, turned, altered, and kept in Repair as in hereinafter is provided and directed; and that from and after the Commencement of this Act, so much of the said Road or Way for the Passage of Travellers, Cattle and Carriages along the same, subject to the Payment of the Tolls hereinafter mentioned.'

Responsibility for this Act was placed on the Trustees including the then Vicar of Dunchurch, Henry Bromfield (Vicar from 1785–1803). Areas mentioned are the Bridle Road from Dunchurch to Southam Gap, Kenches Barn, Thurlaston to Kites Hardwick, Hardwick Bridge, Grandborough to Leamington near a place called Milham. Also mentioned Finford Bridge near Low Farm in the Parish of Southam.

The Turnpike road system reached Warwickshire in the early 18th century and it covered the road from Old Stratford, the Northamptonshire suburb of Stony Stratford, Buckinghamshire, to Dunchurch in Warwickshire, a stretch of some 29 miles of the great road to the north west (now known as the A5). This was the first turnpike road in Warwickshire, terminating at Dunchurch after entering at Willoughby from Northamptonshire, (now known as the A45).





Before the introduction of the Turnpikes, road management in the Middle Ages was a manorial responsibility, with sometimes particular persons being charged with the maintenance of certain roads. Occasionally roads were repaired using funds given as pious offerings and at times, a few cases of tolls being collected by authority of royal letters patent.

Gradually, over time, parishes and townships began to maintain their own highways. This became statute law by the Act of 1555. This system remained the basis of highway administration for nearly three centuries.

The surveyor of highways would be chosen for each parish and in some cases parishes combined. The office of surveyor went the round of 'substantial householders' like other officers of constable, churchwarden and overseer of the poor – and also like these, it was unpaid. The Commonwealth Parliament gave surveyors the power to levy highway rates, of up to a shilling in the pound. The Restoration Parliament reduced this to six pence in the pound.

In certain areas the clay soil caused many problems in maintaining the roads. Defoe said 'the soil of the middle part of England...is of a deep, stiff clay...and the road to Coventry through Towcester, Hill Morton, Dunchurch for nearly 80 miles.'

Today, we are used to hard, smooth

Disgraceful State of the Turnpike Road (*Rugby Advertiser* 1850)

The road leading from Kites Hardwick to Hill on the Dunchurch and Southam turnpike has for some time past been in a disgraceful state, caused by parties occupying or owning land adjoining, felling trees and allowing them to lie so as to cause a great obstruction to the traffic, and the utmost caution is required to avoid an accident, either by riding or driving, particularly at night.

roads, and cannot readily comprehend the term 'deep' being applied to a highway. It referred to the construction used in the 18th century when they raked the surface smooth, the surface being mainly the surface of the soil, then dumping on a layer of gravel or small stones. As soon as the wet weather set in, the stones began to sink and the wet soil would squelch up between them and spread over the surface. Wheels would sink too and the ruts made, grew deeper and deeper. Occasionally a plough would be used before raking and sometimes brushwood or larger stones would be laid in the ruts.

Today, we have potholes to contend with and the ever-present problem of who pays the bill for keeping our roads 'In Repair'.




