

#### Heart of England Britain in Bloom Certificate


We were delighted to receive a certificate and the following message from the Heart of England.

were displayed, and windows were decorated in memory of Fred



#### **Dunchurch Parish Council**

hen I last submitted a piece to FODS magazine in July, I mentioned that I had been working from home during the Covid-19 pandemic, fully expecting that I would be safely ensconced back in the Parish Office when I next sent an article! Obviously though, I have not been able to do this, nor open the community library.

Despite this, I have been busy and have submitted three important consultations which will ultimately influence the potential for further development in and around Dunchurch. One is the revised Draft SW Rugby Supplementary Planning Document and can be found on www. rugby.gov.uk/swrugby.The revised draft includes amendments made following changes to the national planning policy guidance and representations received during the public consultation last year. The other two consultations concern major changes to the planning system and could potentially put pressure on rural areas once again: see www.gov. uk/government/consultations/planning-for-the-future. Running alongside this consultation is another one looking at 'planning short-term proposals and increasing the threshold for permissions in principle' www.gov.uk/government/ consultations/changes-to-thecurrent-planning-system.

Regarding planning, DPC has also reactivated the Dunchurch Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group following lockdown, and this is really, really important in respect of future development in and around Dunchurch, amongst other things. When the Plan is adopted by RBC, it is classed as a material consideration when approving planning permissions. If you would like to be involved in this friendly group, please contact me.

DPC commissioned nine vehicle activated signs in Dunchurch to be repaired and they are all now functioning properly. We are looking into possibly harvesting data from a SIM card in the signs.

A Dunchurch Community Speed Watch Group has been set up by councillors and four more people have already volunteered, making a total of twelve volunteers. If you would like to help, please get in touch with me or any councillor. DPC has procured a defibrillator which has been installed on the wall underneath the Dunchurch Library sign.

One of the most important tasks the DPC undertakes is to respond to planning applications each month. These can usually be seen via the minutes on the DPC website and the Rugby Borough Council Planning Portal https://planning.agileapplications.co.uk/rugby/

#### search-applications.

Details of income and expenditure can be found on the council website https://dunchurchpc.org/agendas-and-minutes.php, together with the latest finance reports. At 30 September there was £232,446 in the current account and £26,500 in the deposit account. The website is being redeveloped, and will contain much more information and we hope, be a lot easier to navigate when it is completed.

During lockdown, DPC councillors have been working tirelessly on various tasks and projects, including commissioning a structural report to protect the thatched bus shelter and the cleaning of the war memorial and statue.

Unfortunately, Ken Knott resigned from the Parish Council in September and we would like to take the opportunity to thank him publicly for all of his hard work and commitment on behalf of the community – he will be sadly missed!

#### **Dunchurch Community Library**

I have been keeping in touch with the very valued library volunteers to see how they have managed during the Covid-19 pandemic.

Some are raring to come back and some are naturally a little apprehensive. Protecting both volunteers and

members of the public is paramount, and the situation seems to keep changing with alarming regularity! DPC is looking at ways we can mitigate the risks, but for the time-being Dunchurch Community Library will have to remain closed, as many community managed libraries in the area are. I will let you know when the library will re-open.

#### **Community Grants**

Applications for the Parish Council community grants are invited from social organisations in Dunchurch. Applicants must be not-for-profit organisations with a constitution and a bank account, and which publish their accounts, where applicable. The grants applied for should show a benefit mainly to the residents of Dunchurch parish. Applications not conforming to these criteria will not be considered.

#### Who will he be?


As Christmas approaches, our thoughts turn to what character our dear Lord John will be dressed as. We wait with bated breath but in the meantime, it seems an ideal time to start a new three-part history of the gentleman himself.

#### Lord John Douglas Montagu Douglas Scott – Part 1

he Montagu family owned extensive estates, mainly in Northamptonshire, their principal seat being Boughton House near Kettering. When the Dukedom became extinct, the estate passed to a daughter, Elizabeth who, in 1767 married Henry Scott, 3rd Duke of Buccleuch. The Scotts of Buccleuch, one of the great Scottish families owned immense estates. Elizabeth outlived both her husband and her son and upon her death in 1827, she begueathed the estates in the Dunchurch area to her grandson, Lord John Scott. At that time, these estates covered more than 4.000 acres and included Dunchurch, Cawston and Newnham Regis.

The Rt. Hon. John Douglas Montagu Douglas Scott was born in 1809, the 3rd son of the 4th Duke of Buccleuch and was only 10 years old when his father died from tuberculosis at Lisbon. After being educated at Eton and serving in the Grenadier Guards, he was elected



Conservative MP for the county of Roxburghshire and remained in parliament until 1837.

Although he had another residence, Caroline Park near Edinburgh, (one of the seats of the Duke of Buccleuch), he often resided at Cawston, becoming interested and involved in the local area and was elected one of the Trustees of Rugby School. Lord John Scott was a well known sportsman and kept a racing stable at Cawston. He was a keen angler, a yachtsman of some repute and his yacht, 'Flower of Yarrow' was one of the fastest afloat at that time in British waters.

On 16 March 1836, Lord John married Alicia Anne Spottiswoode, elder daughter of John Spottiswoode Esquire of Spottiswoode, Berwickshire. Lady John Scott, described as a noted beauty, was greatly interested in Scottish history and was a songwriter and composer, known chiefly for the tune, 'Annie Laurie', to which the

words of a 17th century poet, William Douglas were set. Her motto was 'Haud, (hold) fast by the past'.

Lord John was very much associated with Rev. John Sandford's time in the village of Dunchurch and was generous with his time and funds. They were both committed to the welfare of the local people and especially the education of the children. Lord John donated land for the National School for Girls and Infants and was the chief subscriber to its building. Lord John died without issue, in his 51st year on the 31st January 1860.

#### Living the good life

ext year (2021) will be the 10th anniversary of the launching of Dunchurch Allotment Association. an organisation formed by tenants on the allotments on Coventry Road. The site is believed to be the original Poor Plots and has been an allotment location for hundreds of years - the occasional discovery of the remains of clay pipe parts would confirm that. With over ninety plots and associated paths, two communal greenhouses and communal sheds, members of the Association work hard to maintain and improve the site in addition to providing services to members.

Each year the Association engages its members in projects which develop a greater sense of community, ranging from building bird boxes to publishing an

allotment cookbook. The Association is also active in the local community, raising funds for the Dunchurch Festival Group, delivering excess produce to people in need and giving talks

on gardening

It is noticeable how the demand for allotments has

increased over the last six months with requests for a plot being received almost every fortnight. In April there were two people on the waiting list; this has risen to nineteen in October. This is reflected nationally where applications for allotments in England have soared during the coronavirus pandemic as consumers seek to embrace 'the good life' and grow their own fruit and vegetables during lockdown. It is also noticeable how those enjoying an allotment have changed in the last decade; allotments are no longer the preserve of retired men but we now have a diverse community including many families who have

> taken on a plot to work together in an endeavor and teach their children about food, a healthy diet and lifestyle.

#### **Doctors in Dunchurch**

Part 7: The 1980s

rs Blundstone and Hunter continued to serve the growing population of Dunchurch and southern Rugby through the 1970s but as housing increased, the practice list expanded and it became apparent that a third doctor would be needed. Dunchurch doctors had hitherto been male. The first female British doctor, Elizabeth Garrett Anderson, qualified in 1865 but men still dominated the profession for another century. Only 20% of medical students were women in 1950, but today women outnumber men as medical students and as GPs.

When Dr Penny Holcroft joined the practice in 1981 she became the first female GP in Dunchurch. An established local doctor with a particular interest in child health, Dr Holcroft also worked in the Community Child Health Clinic in Bilton. Paediatric Surveillance, as it came to be known, was assimilated into practices in the late 80s and continues to this day. Rather than reacting to illness, the process was intended to proactively seek out potential problems and address them early. Dr Holcroft later developed an interest and expertise in homeopathy which added a further dimension to



patient care and choice.

Another development in 1980s general practice was the introduction of computers. The potential to record (legible!) notes, produce accurate prescriptions quickly and to audit and analyse data was enormous, though the early pre-Windows systems were quite basic. Computer systems evolved rapidly and by 2004 all new GP records in Dunchurch were electronic.

The NHS and Community Care Act 1990 led to more changes, the introduction of an 'internal-market' in the NHS with a 'Purchaser/Provider split' and GPs cast as 'Fundholders' (purchasers) and hospitals as providers. This new financial market ideology would dominate health services for the next 30 years.

In Dunchurch, the premises which had seemed so generous in 1967 were once again bulging at the seams and in the late 80s the doctors invested considerable time and effort to locate and obtain a plot and make plans for a new surgery. Would they succeed?


